Ali Anderson is the founder and executive director of Feed Black Futures, the only Black, Queer, and women-led organization in California investing in Black farmers. FBF ensures prison and jail-impacted mamas and caregivers receive and grow the food that they need to nourish their communities. Since 2020, the organization has organized over 5,607 deliveries to 198 Black individuals throughout California.

Olayinka Iyinolakan

Olayinka Iyinolakan is the founder of CDIAL, a social impact startup that addresses digital inequities in Africa by creating and distributing speech-activated localized technology that uses artificial and collective intelligence. By enabling communication and the translation of 180 languages, CDIAL empowers Africans who do not fluently communicate in English, French, Arabic or Portuguese — the most spoken colonial languages across Africa.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2024

From selecting one of our most global Fellow cohorts yet to making significant progress on the Racial Equity Philanthropic Fund goals, Echoing Green's impact soared this past year.

And as we look ahead to the future, we're eager to take what we've learned over nearly four decades to deepen our impact significantly. We're excited to share that we've launched an important new initiative: The Signal Fund.

The Signal Fund is a founder-first capital solution for social innovators. Through The Signal Fund, Echoing Green invests risk capital at a critical stage in the lifecycle of existing Fellows' organizations. In its initial round of investments, The Signal Fund distributed a total of \$1.5 million in catalytic capital to five Fellows.

One of those Fellows is Laurin Leonard '18, After her technology company, R3Score, received a \$250,000 patient working capital investment from The Signal Fund, Laurin is positioned to hit key milestones and secure a subsequent round of funding.

Looking ahead to 2024, we're excited to share more about The Signal Fund, work with our partners to support more extraordinary Fellows, and invest in more bold, community-led solutions for change throughout the world.
